

We concluded our photos in genealogy series with a Zoom presentation from Laura Hedgecock teaching us how to incorporate stories to the pictures we have in our genealogy.


Some take-aways from the meeting:


The Vivid-Pix has been delivered to Hackley Library. We are waiting set up, then select members will be trained to aid with public usage. Watch our website and newsletter for updates.

Online Newspapers

Sitting at the breakfast table with a cup of coffee on a Sunday morning with a newspaper in hand is more of a memory than a reality in today's technological day. Even this newsletter has very few printed and distributed.

But for our ancestors, this was the way to know the who, what, where and whys of the day. Newspapers from the past are the Facebook of today. With technology growing, the ease of finding our ancestors is becoming increasingly easier. This month's tips are going to be delving into newspaper websites to help you locate and read the gossip of times gone by in no time at all.

Up first is a paid site; <u>Newspapers.com</u>, owned by Ancestry.com (which is included in the new All Access Family Plan subscription). They boast a whopping 955,086,712 pages of newspapers to explore. Another popular one is GenealogyBank.com а division of Newsbank, inc. This is a more affordable option (always running sales) for those on a tighter budget and boasts it has 15,000 newspapers with billions of historical records dating back to 1690 of which 95% are exclusive to GenealogyBank. 
