

Do you or someone you know have a Muskegon County High school year book and you have no idea what to do with it? Well, here is one solution...

Donate them to the Torrent house. Our local History Department is looking for the following editions:

Only for the missing years that are listed below. NOTE: Muskegon High School - Torrent already has a complete set from 1895 thru 2022. No additional copies needed.

Bluffton Elementary School - 1991 or older., and 1994, 1995, 1998, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005 Bunker Middle School - 2001 or older, and 2006, 2007, 2012

Mona Shores High School - 1968 or older, 1970, and 1972 and after. The library only has 1969 and 1971! Muskegon Catholic Central High School - 1953 or older, 1970, 1971, 1973, 1977 thru 1982, and 1984 to 2012 Muskegon Heights High School - 1921 or older, and 1968 to 2012.

Muskegon Junior College - They only have 1947, 1948, and 1949. Anything else would be appreciated! Nelson Junior High - They only have 1973 and 1975. Anything else would be appreciated!

North Muskegon High School - 1940 and older, 1942 thru 1944, 1946 thru 1948, 1962 thru 1964, 1974, 1986, 1988, 1990, 1992, 1998 thru 2000, 2002, 2004 thru 2007, 2011, 2012.

Oakridge High School - 1973 and older, and 1975 thru 1982, 1984 thru 1988, 1990, 1996, 1999, 2000. Orchard View High School - 1961 and older, and 1963, 1964, 1970, 1972, 1973, 1976, 1977, 1981, 1983, 1984, 1985, 1986, and 1988 and after.

Ravenna High School - They only have 1946 and 1948. Anything else would be appreciated!

Reeths Puffer High School - 1958 and before, and 1965, 1966, 1981, 1982, 1985 thru 1990, and 1992 thru 2012

Steele Middle School - They only have 2007 thru 2012. Anything before or after that would be appreciated!

St. Jean's - They only have 1950 and 1952. Anything else would be appreciated!

Western Michigan Christian High School - They only have 1958, 1959, 1984 and 1985. Anything before or after that would be appreciated!

Whitehall High School - 1987 and older, and 1989, 1994, 1996, 1997, 1999 thru 2012



In a recent webinar that I joined by DNA expert Diahan Southard from YourDNAGuide.com

(Test, Analyze Repeat), she offered advice about each of the five DNA testing companies, and she rated them on several criteria. Allow me to share with you what I learned.

There are two ways to test for DNA, a cheek swab, and a spit test. You must decide which one is best for you. But you also must look at the testing pool (how many have already tested in which yours will be compared

to). And there's also the matter of where you expect to find DNA matches (where in the world are your ancestors from?).

With these three factors to consider Diahan rated the five testing companies as follows:

AncestryDNA has 20 million testers, and they have great ethnicity estimates. (5 ½ ribbons)

23andMe has 13.8 million in their testing pool and they have good ethnicity estimates, BUT they do not have a way to build a family tree on their

website. (2 ribbons)

MyHeritageDNA has 5.1 million testers, and they have a great ethnicity estimator. (4 ribbons)

FamilyTreeDNA only has 1.5 million testers and ethnicity estimates are not a strength. (1 ½ ribbons)

LivingDNA has an unknown number of testers, but it is perfect if you have U.K. ancestors only. (1 ribbon)

The clear winner here was AncestryDNA. Plus, you can build your family tree on their website and find relatives that match your DNA.

Are you confused about what DNA company to test with?

Are you seeking advice about what each company offers.

Diahan Southard from YourDNAGuide has the best advice about that.
