


Last Meeting Highlights

AI (Artificial Intelligence) is making its debut in the genealogy world. Let's start off by saying, because of AI the 1950 census was made public and searchable in a record four months!!

I recently listened to an interview with Thomas MacEntee explaining exactly what AI was and its benefits and conflicts within the genealogical community.

He stated that AI was basically a computer-based system that can mimic human intelligence – and the goal is to have it perform human tasks. One of the largest platforms of AI is called ChatGPT.

Thomas stated that there are two types of features of

AI. This first being "deep learning". This mimics the human brain, looking for patterns using vast amounts of information to interpret photos, audio and text. The second is "generative AI". This is when new content (photos, audio or text) is generated based information the user provides. It uses its own database of training data to understand patterns and generate output that matches the user's query.

Al looks like it will be here to stay and next month I will be sharing where in the world of genealogy Al is being used, followed by the benefits and conflicts of using it.

SOMETIMES, YOU JUST GOTTA LOVE GOOGLE Contributed by Fran Harrington I got a research request in from a man named

Hans. The request came all the way from Sweden. He was looking for information on his grandmother's aunt Louisa, who was living in Muskegon in the late 1880-1941. He gave a lot of pertinent information on his request form which made it quite easy to find most of what he was looking for. Louisa had 3 children, Edwin, Anna Louise, and Charles. I sent him the information I found on each of them. Since I didn't know how it would work getting money from Sweden, instead of charging him the going rate, I let him know he could make a donation to the Society, if he wanted. A couple weeks later, we got a donation from him for \$100 (US)! He emailed me and asked if I might help him find a "living relative" of Louisa's. He had family history and pictures he wanted to share with her descendants. Since he'd been so generous, I told him I'd give it a shot, not really expecting to find anything. After all, I was used to looking for dead people, not live ones. It turns out that Louisa's daughter Anna died shortly after marrying Henry G. in Spring Lake, MI. They had a daughter, Dorothy G, who married Harold W. The couple had a son, William. William married JoAnn C. After that, I was able to find William's obituary by doing a google search, and thank goodness, it named his children. One of his married children was named Kristine B. After a couple more google searches, I was actually able to find not only her mailing address, but her email address too. I emailed her and explained the situation and that I was hoping she might be interested in the pictures and information that Hans had. Within an hour, I got a reply. She was so

excited! She said she was definitely interested. It turns out that she does genealogy and was currently researching that line of her family. Who'd of thought I'd actually find someone who was doing genealogy! I gave her Hans' email, and gave him hers, so they could contact each other. I was happy that I could help Hans with his request, Hans was happy he found a family member he could share his findings/pictures with, and Kristine was happy to be receiving information she would never find online. Sometimes, you just gotta love Google!

It boasts it "provides more applications for comparing your DNA test results with the most people worldwide". The *FREE tools include One-to-Many DNA comparison, One-to-One DNA comparison, and Admixture (heritage).

*There are several tools that can be accessed at different tier costs.

DIG with the Genetic Genies

When was the last time you were on a first date?

Some of us might not even remember. Well, this is the way we are supposed to "talk" to our DNA matches when we reach out to them for the first time. Let me refresh you:

- 1. Address them by their USER name
- 2. DON'T talk about yourself too much
- 3. Ask simple, direct questions
- Give an "easy action item" (Just let me know you received this even if you are unable to answer the questions")

Remember - the goal is to get them to RESPOND
